Happy New Year! Second mildest December on record sure helps with road salt usage. Let's not get too comfortable with the mild temps as it is still winter in Northeast Ohio.

The new year brings a handful of changes to the **Township Elected official** arena. **Rick Amos**, long-time Township Trustee has decided to "retire" from over thirty-four years of elected public service. Christine J. Page, past Fiscal Officer for nearly thirty years, will now be shifting her responsibilities to that of Township Trustee. Stephanie Parker will now be serving as the Township Fiscal Officer. We will miss Rick and wish him the best in his future endeavors. We also looking forward to welcoming Chris Page in her new role and Stephanie Parker as Fiscal Officer.

The **Hometown Hero Banner program** is open once again. Applications are due by January 31st to the Perry Admin. Office. All information and applications can be found on our website at www.perrytownship-lake.com If you have any questions, please contact the Township Office. These banners will be added to our current program and will be installed by Memorial Day.



Just a reminder that we have a "Flag Mailbox" located in the south driveway of the Township Admin. Parking lot. The mailbox is painted red, white and blue. Residents may place their torn or tattered flags in this box. The American Legion holds appropriate retirement/flag burning ceremonies for these tattered flags once or twice a year.

2024 is planned to be the next "year of paving". As we finalize appropriations, we are planning to set aside an additional \$400,000 for street resurfacing. All of our paving projects are prioritized based on the Township's pavement analysis performed by an independent engineer. This year we are looking to pave Maple Street (Route 84 to Village line), Red Oak Drive and White Oak Court.

It is anticipated in 2024 that the Zoning Commission will initiate the process for reviewing and udpating the Township's Comprehensive Zoning Plan. This process does not assume that there will be any changes to the plan, but it is good practice to review it.

We are pleased to announce that we will holding another **Shred-it** event this Fall. The event is scheduled for **Saturday, October 26**th from 9:00 am - Noon. This is the perfect time to go through all of your papers and start filling some bags to shred that include personal information. All shredding is done onsite.

From time to time, Perry Township has opportunities for residents to serve on different boards. The openings are generally residents of the Township that are appointed by the Board of Trustees. Some of the Boards included are the Perry Area Joint Recreation Board, the Zoning Commission, Perry Economic Development Council, Board of Zoning Appeals and the Perry Fall Festival. If you would be interested in serving on a Board in the future, please send a letter of interest to the attention of the Perry Township Administrator. We will keep it on file for when such an opening exists.

Just a friendly reminder, please don't park in the streets or especially the cul-de-sacs during winter snow events. Vehicles parked in these areas make it difficult for the plows to clean the road properly. Have a warm and safe winter season.

PERRY HISTORICAL SOCIETY



It has been a very busy fall season here at the museum. The third grade class again visited to learn all about our Perry history, and what the early schools looked like. Some of the buildings still stand today as residential homes. The society sponsored a Halloween event with speaker Tonya Busic from the Lake County History Center presenting 'Eerie and Odd Legends'. The program also included some local ghost stories. The museum again participated in the 'Trunk or Treat' day for

the children as well. There always seems to be magic in the air at this time of year.

The society held it's annual Christmas open house on Saturday, December 9th. The visitors enjoyed live music by Brian Dorr and Ben Soriano, and our own Don Densmore on the accordion. Santa made an early stop to the museum to the delight of the children. They whispered to Santa what they were hoping for at Christmas.

We have been collaborating with Tom Anderson and the American Legion regarding the MIA Memorial which will be located at the corner of Main Street and Center Road. Our members have been working diligently behind the scenes at the museum to review and reorganize old documents and papers. I was looking though some old newsletters and came across the following article that caught my eye.

The giant North Perry Oak Tree By John Hise - 2002

Four hundred years ago, Ohio was covered with ancient hardwood forests. The early pioneers cleared the forests so they could farm the land. Virgin forest is almost extinct in Ohio, and is only found in a few isolated



pockets. Discovering a few ancient trees in North Perry was a pleasurable discovery for Joyce Phillips, Mr. Meyers, Marylyn Hise, and I. The owner of the isolated pocket of ancient trees contacted Joyce Phillips in order to explore property and determine if the old trees still existed. The four of us went trudging into the isolated pocket of woods with a tape measure and digital camera to find the mighty black oak tree!

Four feet above the ground, we measured the circumference of the Oak Tree. The gargantuan tree measured 12 feet in circumference. Mr. Meyers documented the tree with numerous digital photographs. The tree's age was calculated by multiplying the circumference times an arborist calculation number for oak trees. The massive and healthy oak

tree is a survivor from North Perry's virgin forest. The ancient tree is at least 600 years old!

Discovering such a rare specimen of history in Perry was an exciting experience of living history. We hope the living legend is preserved for future generations to enjoy.

After a few inquiries of my own, it is believed those mighty oak trees were victim to Lake Erie erosion.

Missing in Action (MIA) Memorial



It's currently sitting outside at Jim Belding Monuments on Route 20 in Madison. We appreciate their support and that provided by the American Legion, American Veterans (AMVETS), Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) and their Auxiliaries, and Perry Township, X Press Printing Services and local individual Donors. We currently have four Veteran Memorials in Perry - only a few of our residents know who they honor and where they are located. Let's put a FREEZE on Winter Fires

Home fires occur more in winter than any other season. As you stay cozy and warm this winter, BE FIRE SMART! Did you know that half of all home heating fires occur in December, January, and February? Did you know that 1 in every 7 home fires and 1 in every 5 home fire deaths involves heating equipment?

Here are some simple solutions to stay fire safe this winter season.

1) Keep anything that can burn AT LEAST 3 feet from any heat source i.e. fireplaces, wood/pellet burning stoves, radiators or SPACE heaters.



- 2) If you do have a fireplace or wood/pellet stove, after you clean it out, store the cooled ashes in a tightly covered METAL container and keep it outside at least 10 feet away from your home or any nearby buildings.
- 3) For your fireplace or wood/pellet stove, you should have a qualified professional clean and inspect your chimney at the start of the season. Did you know that the chimney sweeping industry is unregulated and as such, there is no legal requirement for a chimney sweep to do training or join a trade body? The National Chimney Sweep Guild (NCSG), manages 3 industry-leading chimney sweep credentials: Certified Chimney Professional (CCP), Certified Chimney Reliner (CCR), and Certified Chimney Journeyman (CCJ). These knowledge-based exams were developed directly with NCSG member businesses and input of nearly 600 U.S. Chimney professionals.
- 4) If you are using an electric space heater, always plug it into a wall outlet and never into an extension cord or power strip. Appliances that draw large amounts of electricity should never share an outlet.
- 5) Keep portable generators outside away from windows/doors, even a closed window/door could allow C.O. to seep into your house and never run a generator in your garage. It's best to keep your running generator at least 10 feet from your house.
- 6) Speaking of C.O. (Carbon Monoxide). Did you know that C.O. is a colorless and odorless gas? And did you know that at just 35 p.p.m. after 8 hours you will start to develop signs and symptoms of C.O. poisoning? This is why for the safety of your family, we recommend that you install a carbon monoxide alarm and test it at least once a month. Keep these simple solutions in mind for a safe and warm winter.

PERRY TOWNSHIP ZONING

Coming up on 2 years of being in this position, I can assure everyone, that the Township is entirely about the community. I have worked with the Administration, the Trustees, the various Boards and the various Departments, and everyone always tries to do what is best for the Township and assist the businesses and residents in this community. We are often bombarded by negativity and turmoil both Nationally and Worldwide and can easily be discouraged. We are most grateful for our very generous community. These eight churches: Bridge, Faith Baptist, First Baptist, New Life, North Star, Perry Christian, Perry United Methodist, and St. Cyprian,

support us year-round with soap products, paper products, food items and monetary donations. They support our special projects of Easter Baskets with candy and for our Christmas program, they provide a food item for the food boxes. These churches also provide the volunteers to ring bells for the Red Kettle Campaign for Salvation Army.

The money raised is used to assist our clients with rent and utility bills.

Other great supporters include school groups, community groups, area businesses and individuals who all contribute their time, talent, and treasures - all of which help us to do what we do at The Perry Center. Special thanks to Perry Schools Maintenance Department, Rideout's IGA, and West Orchards and Farm Market for their year-round support.

Of course, our volunteers top our "Gratitude List". The Perry Center is staffed only with volunteers. We have more than 40 regular volunteers and about 50 more for special events. This Christmas, we had 41 volunteers devote 184 hours of their time packing the food boxes and then helping distribute them and the Christmas gifts to our clients.



Christmas, this year, was full of surprises. We had an anonymous supporter donate enough money so that we could provide a ham for each family and a gift card for every adult. We also worked with Brody Hicks, a sophomore at Perry High School, who owns and operates Upcycle Cycles. Brody provided refurbished bicycles and helmets for sixty-four (64) of our clients' children.

This year, we had 100 families apply for Christmas assistance, consisting of 233 adults and 159 children. Of the 159 children, 116 were "adopted" by 32 organizations, and/or individuals, 16 participated in the Sheetz program, and 27 were helped by The Perry Center.

After our Christmas distribution, we received donations of toys from the Lake County Nursery Growers and toys and 13 bicycles from Hell's Angels Lake East. So...if you need a birthday gift for your children, give us a call.

STORMWATER

Even with all of the contamination threats to stormwater, it **CAN** be protected by people just like **YOU**. Here are a few ideas to get you started.



Investigate your home for products (paints, cleaners, etc.) that could contaminate the water if they were poured down the drain or dumped on the ground outside. Mark all these containers as dangerous so family members will be aware to use these products wisely, or set them aside for donations at the next hazardous waste collection day.



Tell others about how hazardous products can contaminate stormwater when thrown into the trash. Instead of pouring chemicals down the drain, use them up so there is only a container remaining. Recycle the container if possible.



Begin using environmentally friendly products instead of hazardous ones. Visit your local library, bookstore or online to find recipes for homemade cleaners using harmless ingredients like vinegar and baking soda.



Participate in the next hazardous waste collection day. There are two special event Hazardous Waste Collections held at the Lake County Fairgrounds this year.



Household Hazardous Waste June 1st and September 21st 2024 Both events are held on Saturdays and the collections run from 8:00 am to 2:00 pm.



These events allow community members to bring in their old paint, motor oil, harmful chemicals, and other materials and have them disposed of properly.
