From the desk of...

Happy New Year!! Mother Nature sure socked it to us over Thanksgiving Weekend. The Service Department did an amazing job with maintaining the roads and keeping them as clear as possible. Thank you for your patience and understanding during this monumental event. Fortunately, most of the snow mounds have melted and we will not have to deal with those piles with future snow events this season.

The voters graciously approved the November renewal levy which will allow us to conduct additional paving in 2025. As 2025 appropriations are being finalized, the plan is to set aside an additional \$400,000-\$500,000 for street resurfacing, based on results of competitive bidding. Similar to last year, we bid our paving projects in conjunction with Madison Township to secure lower pricing. All paving projects are prioritized based on the township's pavement analysis performed by an independent engineer as funds are available.

At the Township Park, the major upgrade to our current restroom facility is underway. This project will include ADA (American with Disabilities Act) upgrades to both the women's and men's area. This upgrade will allow wheelchair access, walkers and those people with aides/companions to easily access the restroom facilities. The upgraded facility will be completed by park opening in 2025.

The Shred It event we held in October was very well attended. We are pleased to announce that we will be hosting another event on **Saturday**, **October 18**, **2025** from 9:00 am - Noon. This is the perfect time to go through all of your papers that include personal information and start filling some bags to shred. All shredding is done on site.

This past December, the Township lost a pillar of our community with the passing of **Rick C. Amos**. Among the many hats that Rick wore, he was a Perry Township Trustee for just short of twenty years. Prior to becoming Trustee, he served fourteen years as a member of the Perry Board of Education. Rick drove around the township every Sunday morning to check things out and see if there was anything out of place that needed to be fixed. Rick was the biggest cheerleader for this community and was always working to make Perry a better place to work, live, play and raise a family. Rick will be dearly missed.

Just a friendly reminder, please don't park in the streets or especially the cul-de-sacs during winter snow events. Vehicles parked in these areas make it difficult for the plows to clean the road properly. Have a warm and safe winter season.

AMERICAN LEGION



Thanks to the generous donations from local veterans, businesses, residents, and veteran service organizations, we were able to complete 70% of the construction of the Perry MIA & Veterans Memorial during 2024. Special thanks to: Hernandez Concrete and Construction, Osborne Companies Inc, Leppo Rents Perry, Handy Rents Painesville and all of our donors and volunteers.

We are building this MIA & Veterans Memorial to raise awareness, and to remember and honor their service and sacrifice. Of the approximately 200,000 missing soldiers, sailors, airmen, marines, coastguardsmen and merchant marines, more than half remain nameless and are remembered only as an estimated number. Among the names of the approximately 90,000 missing since the beginning of World War II, hometown information is currently available for only about 9,000 of them. For most, only their families and friends know who they were, and after a couple of generations their sacrifice is lost forever. The final chapter of their lives remains unknown and no headstone or American Flag flies above their final resting place.

We need your continued support to complete this Memorial. The remaining work includes installation of a walkway to connect the MIA Memorial to the museum and the refurbished Veterans monument, purchasing and engraving eight benches, and landscaping and installation of an entrance monument. Brick Pavers: Please consider memorializing or honoring an MIA or Veteran. 4"x8" and 8"x8" laser-etched brick pavers and 8"x16" long engraved black granite markers are available. Please visit the Memorial and learn more about the assignments and accomplishments inscribed on the 30 veteran brick pavers already installed in the Memorial walkway. We plan on holding a short ceremony to commemorate the installation of the first MIA bricks. We hope to install the first 8"x16" engraved black granite markers prior to Memorial Day. Please submit your order by February 7th if you would like your brick installed prior to Memorial Day. Additional information can be found on the Township, Village and North Perry Village websites. PERRY HISTORICAL SOCIETY



2025 will be a year of celebration for North Perry Village, as the village reaches its 100th anniversary. On July 18, 1925, the village was formed by petition. Spokesmen for the village petition were John Brock and William Seith. North Perry's population in 1925 was 430.

The Perry Historical Society, celebrating its 34th year in 2025, would be honored to assist with North Perry's centennial celebration activities. The Perry Historical Society is in the planning stages for 2025 public events. Events will be advertised on the website and Facebook page.

Ken Densmore was an interesting lifelong Perry resident, who provided his oral history to the Perry Historical Society in 1992, when he was 90 years old. I am providing a short snippet of his oral interview:

Mr. Kenneth Densmore was a long-time resident, who was born in his parents' home, Blair Place, in Perry Township during 1902. When Ken was a young man, he assisted his father, Harry Lester Densmore, with farming and thrashing the grain crops of local farmers. Harry Densmore and Ken would haul the steam operated Hubert Thrashing machine to most of the farms in Perry. They thrashed wheat and oat crops. After thrashing the grains, horse drawn wagons would travel to the Perry railroad depot. Trains would haul the threshed grains to businesses. Ken said before the 1920's, travel on dirt roads in Perry was difficult because of deep ruts or mud from rains. From the Densmore home near Blair Road, a two-horse wagon train would take an hour to reach the Perry train depot. If a horse team was traveling to Painesville, the horses would be refreshed at a watering trough in the middle of Perry Village and at a trough located at the corner of Bowhall Rd and Madison Avenue in Painesville Township.




As always take it slow when driving on snowy roads. Allow yourself extra time and be safe.

This was a busy quarter for us at The Perry Center. We gave out turkeys and chickens for **Thanksgiving** and included such items as sweet potatoes, stuffing mix, gravy and cranberry sauce for their holiday dinner.

<u>Christmas</u> at The Perry Center this year was also very busy. We served 95 households consisting of 157 children and 215 adults. Of the 157 children who applied for Christmas assistance, 121 were "adopted" by organizations and/or individuals, 16 participated in the Sheetz program and 20 were presented gifts from The Perry Center, the Knights of Columbus or other local agencies. Generous donations from our community enabled us to provide a gift card to each family who applied. Each household also received a box of food including a ham with the larger families also receiving a turkey.

We continue to purchase food for the <u>Pirate Power Pack</u> weekend food program. We also provide snacks for several classrooms.



We want to <u>thank</u> all who volunteered this quarter, local gardeners who donated produce, and all who donated money and/or provided gifts for our clients. Eight of our churches in Perry are great supporters: First Baptist, Faith Baptist, New Life, Perry Christian, North Star, Bridge, St. Cyprian and Perry United Methodist churches all provided items for the food boxes, and several "adopted" children for Christmas. ZONING

2024 in review: This past year was one of the busier years in The Township Zoning Department. We issued 115 zoning permits. We reviewed, updated and added some definitions and zoning regulations in the Township Zoning Resolution. Azalea Ridge Farms development, which opened for construction in the second half of 2023, built quickly and is almost complete. Sullivan Development LLC purchased the Industrial property at the South end of Lane Road and did a great job quickly refurbishing those buildings. Several other new businesses moved to Perry and several more are looking to possibly move here in the future.

Outlook for 2025: As we move into the new year, there are several projects that will be started or taking place this year within the Township:

• Route 20/ North Ridge Road- ODOT will be continuing their road widening and paving project. Additionally, Sheetz is working on county permits to rebuild a new and updated facility at their existing location. A couple of new businesses are also looking to possibly move into Perry along North Ridge.



- **Perry Park Road-** The Township and County will be working to bring sewer down through the Industrial Zoned portion of Perry Park Road. This project will allow for more growth in the JEDD. There is currently a prospective company interested in moving to Perry and a couple others that have inquired. Adding sewer to that area will make it more attractive to a greater array of companies.
- Lane Road-Major Waste is looking to move their company headquarters to Perry, into the industrial zoned section of lane Road. They are currently working with the county on their plan.



We have had calls regarding a residential development on Lane Road. To clear up any misconceptions or rumors floating in the community, here is the up-to-date status. That portion of Lane Road is zoned residential. After consideration of several proposals for a Planned Unit Development which would allow smaller parcels and more houses, the Township Trustees and

Administration held firm to maintain the current zoning for the property. This was done to maintain the integrity of the current Zoning Resolution and Township Comprehensive Plan. Parcels must be a minimum of 1 acre and homes must have a minimum of 1800 square feet of living space and adhere to existing setback requirements. A developer is currently working with the various counties and safety agencies on a plan. If/when final approval is received by all agencies, the developer will be able to move ahead with infrastructure, if they choose. Each new home will need separate zoning and county approvals to ensure all zoning, building and health codes are met.
