Just a reminder that our Yard Waste drop-off facility will be closing the last Saturday in November, November 30th. Until then, the hours will remain the same, Wednesdays from noon - 3 pm and Saturdays from 8:00 am - 2:00 pm. This facility will only accept residential drop-offs, no commercial haulers or landscapers.

This upgrade will allow wheelchair access, walkers and those people with aids/companions to easily access the restroom facilities.

When vehicles are parked in these areas it makes it very difficult for the Service Departments to plow appropriately and safely. Let's keep everyone's safety a top priority.

Perry Missing in Action (MIA) & Veterans Memorial

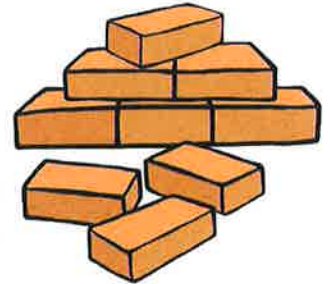
We were thrilled to see the six military service panels installed in August. They serve as a reminder of the commitment our brave Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen, Marines, Coast Guardsmen and Guardians made to defend our freedoms.

The next step is to excavate, install electrical and lighting, and then install brick pavers inside the MIA circle and along a portion of the walkways outside the MIA circle. The lighting fixtures have been ordered but the expected delivery is longer than anticipated.

We hope to receive these materials in time to complete this next phase of construction prior to the end of the year.

We still need approximately \$45,000 to finish the Memorial. Sponsorships for the service panels are no longer available but a few remain for the four-foot long black granite benches. Our goal is to complete construction of the Memorial by Memorial Day 2025.

Brick Pavers: Please consider memorializing one of the estimated 200,000 MIAs or honoring a Veteran. If you are interested in an MIA paver, contact Tom Anderson (cell: 330-352-5378, tom11tom22@roadrunner.com) to discuss options. 4"x8" and 8"x8" laser-etched brick pavers and 8"x16" long engraved black granite markers are available. As a keepsake for memorializing an MIA, you will receive a set of "dog tags" embossed with the MIA's information. PERRY JOINT FIRE DISTRICT



The Perry Joint Fire District is excited to announce that we were awarded \$72,487.61 from the Assistance to Firefighters Grant. The total award is \$76,112.00 and the Fire District's share is \$3,624.39. This grant will help replace some of our out of service and outdated fire hose and nozzles. Station 1 and 2 front line engines will have all new and up to date fire hose. All 3 of our engines will have all new and up to date fire nozzles. With the new fire hose and nozzles, the firefighters will be able to flow more water and also reduce the amount of force the firefighters receive when flowing water. Most of our current hose and nozzles are approaching 20 years old. Over time, the hose and nozzles start to break and or fail during testing. Without this award, the Fire District would not be able to replace this amount of hose and nozzles. Thank you to our Fire Board for their continued support and also our Grant Writing Committee for their continued efforts each year writing our grants.

The Fall Festival was a great success this year. Thank you to our Explorers under the direction of Lt. Brian Gralewski that participated. Thank you also to our duty crews that displayed our apparatus. The dunk tank was also a success, but the water was cold. Hope to see everyone again next year.

With summer coming to an end soon the winter chills will be upon us. For our residents that use space heaters, here are some safety recommendations. Nearly half of all home heating fires happen during the months of December, January, and February—and they're often caused when a heater (typically an electric one) is placed too close to curtains, bedding, or upholstered furniture.

Space Heater Safety Tips

- Place the heater on a hard, level, and nonflammable surface. These appliances are intended to sit on the floor, not on a table.
- Establish a 3-foot kid- and pet-free zone around the heater, and never put a space heater



in a child's room.

- Keep the space heater at least 3 feet away from combustible materials, such as furniture, bedding, and curtains. A taller heater may need to be even farther away.

- Turn it off when you leave the room or go to bed.
- Unplug the heater when it's not in use by pulling the plug straight from the outlet.
- Check the cord for damage periodically, and don't use the heater if the cord is frayed or worn.
- Do not plug another electrical device or an extension cord into the same outlet as a heater or use a power strip to extend the reach of the space heater cord. This can cause overheating which result in a fire.



- Install working smoke alarms on every level of your home and in every bedroom. It is suggested to test them monthly.

HOW DO WE USE WATER?

Water is a resource that has many uses, including recreational, transportation, hydroelectric power, agricultural, domestic, industrial, and commercial uses. Water also supports all forms of life and affects our health, lifestyle, and economic well being. As individuals, we use water for sanitation, drinking, and many other human needs, and we pay for the public water utilities that provide water. Examples of the amount of water used by an individual during everyday activities are shown below (compare the gallons to a gallon of milk):

•Flush a toilet	5 - 7 gallons
•Run a dishwasher	15 - 25 gallons
•Wash dishes by hand	20 gallons
•Wash a small load of clothes in washing machine	35 gallons
•Brush teeth (water running continuously)	2 - 5 gallons
•Water a small lawn	35 gallons
•Take a shower	25 - 50 gallons
•Take a bath	50 gallons



The average American uses 140 to 160 gallons of water per day.

Although more than $\frac{3}{4}$ of the Earth's surface is made up of water, only 2.8 percent of the Earth's water is available for human consumption. The other 97.2 percent is in the oceans; however, this water is too salty to use for most purposes, and the salt is very costly to remove. Most of the Earth's fresh water is frozen in polar ice caps, icebergs, and glaciers.

Although water flows from our faucets throughout the day, we often take the amount of fresh water available on Earth for granted. As the world's population increases, water consumption increases. Preventing water pollution and conserving water are important to assure a continuing abundance of water that is safe to use for ourselves and future generations.

Water pollution is any human-caused contamination of water that reduces its usefulness to humans and other organisms in nature. Pollutants such as herbicides, pesticides, fertilizers, and hazardous chemicals can make their way into our water supply. When our water supply is contaminated, it is a threat to human, animal, and plant health unless it goes through a costly purification procedure.

Examples of pollution and its effects on water bodies are listed below.

- ✓ Pollutants can come from a specific source such as a pipe that discharges used water or other material from a factory into a water body. Such discharges can harm the aquatic ecosystem.
- ✓ Pollutants can also come from large areas such as agricultural fields that have been covered with fertilizer or pesticides. Fertilizer and pesticide residues can run off or wash into streams and rivers or seep into soil, contaminating underlying groundwater.
- ✓ Pollutants can also come from parking lots, gardens, driveways, sidewalks, lawns, and roads. Rain water or melted snow can transfer materials such as oil, litter, fertilizers, and salt down storm sewer inlets found on the streets. In some areas, the storm sewer transports this polluted water to a water treatment facility. In other areas, the storm sewer transports this polluted water to a nearby river, lake, stream, or wetland.
- ✓ Pollutants can contaminate our drinking water sources, reduce oxygen levels which can kill fish and other wildlife, accumulate in the tissue of fish we catch and eat from the lakes, and reduce the beauty of the water.

We at The Perry Center have changed the way we are communicating with our clients. We are using emails and texts where possible. Mail will be used only if a client doesn't have a cell phone number or an email address.

Applications for Christmas were sent on September 19th. Please check your email and texts for the application. If you did not receive yours, please call 440/259-3332 or cell 440/897-2574. Applications are due on or before Friday, October 18th.

We used texts to get applications to our clients for school supplies and it worked quite well. We supplied 81 students with backpacks and the school supplies on their lists.



NOTE: If you need assistance and are not already a client of The Perry Center, you may apply if you live, work and/or worship in Perry. We provide food every 30 days, the amount is based on the size of your family. We also have special projects for children ages 0 through 17 - Easter (Easter baskets), school supplies and Christmas (gifts). Families receive a box or boxes of food. We also assist (once a year) with utilities, if you have a disconnect notice and/or rent, if you have an eviction notice.

At this time it is not yet accessible as we are waiting on signage but hope by the time of this publication it will be ready for use. Future plans include adding a water line to the new section next spring.



* Our household battery recycling continues to do well. You donated, and we took to be recycled, 60lbs of batteries that were collected in just 2 months. This is an ongoing program at the park so keep saving those batteries!

* The Park Committee put on a very successful Summer Family Fun Day on Sunday July 14th. The weather was hot and dry and the many water activities were very welcome. * The Wildflower & Pollinator Meadow is in full fall bloom at this writing. Fall flowers such as Aster, Bidens, Milkweed & Goldenrod are feeding many pollinators before winter. This fall we hope to get an arbor erected at the entrance of the meadow, clean up and reseeding. Many thanks to O'Keefe Excavating and American Pride for donating and delivering some great hollow

logs and tree stumps to add to the habitat for the creatures. Come walk the path and check it out!
